Here in Bucks County, we're all familiar with William Penn. After all, our state carries his name, some of our local schools are named after him, and he built his summer home, Pennsbury Manor, overlooking the Delaware River.

But did you know that he **lived here for less than four years?**

In that time, he founded Philadelphia, once described as a "howling wilderness," and developed it into the largest and most influential city in the 13 colonies. An advocate of democracy and religious freedom, Penn also arranged treaties with the Lenape people who lived in the Delaware Valley, and he wrote numerous works about his beliefs.
